The Three Branches of Government are the Legislative branch, Judicial branch, and Executive branch. The Legislative writes the law, the Judicial interprets the law, and the Executive enforces the law. The branches are governed by checks and balances. Without the Separation of Powers, we could have a President who acts like a king! The Three Branches of Government secure our freedom by keeping checks and balances, observing The Separation of Powers, and by following the Constitution.
